Proposal

With this special issue we intend to make a compilation of unpublished articles that analyze from different points of view (whether economic, theological, criminological, legal or psychological) the existing global problem of jihadist terrorism.

It is increasingly common for terrorist groups that are preparing some type of attack to be dismantled. Sometimes these attacks are prevented by security forces and bodies, but unfortunately, not all of them are and they come to fruition. They are usually large-scale attacks, causing the greatest possible damage in the shortest possible time and instilling fear in the population.

To know why they occur and how to try to prevent them, the act itself must be studied from different points of view and even come up with a prior intervention proposal to detect those people who are in a process of radicalization or who could be the target of such intentions.

Economic sources are of great importance since, although except in special cases, they require large amounts of money to finance the activity, travel, new identities or materials. Organizing an attack is a convoluted job in which there is always a pyramidal structure that goes from the executor to the person who designs it and who is usually outside the country itself. These cells, which will work independently and in isolation, are activated automatically and guickly to avoid detection.

Phase 1 (within 30 days)

Phase 2 (within 15 days)

Review of the proposals and determination of those accepted, minor corrections, major corrections or not accepted.

Phase 3 (within 45-60 days)

Submission of the final proposal.

- Title, name and surname of the author(s) (maximum 3 authors), abstract and keywords (maximum 5) must be entered.
- Minimum length 15 pages, maximum 25 pages
- Arial 12, line spacing 1.
- Word format
- References and bibliography in APA 7°
- *All proposals must indicate whether they are derived from own research, doctoral thesis, financed by an entity or university, as well as funds derived from the state.
